THE CHALLENGE

In Lamoille County, 69% OF INFANTS (BIRTH TO 2 YEARS OLD) likely to need care don't have access to any regulated child care.

And 55% OF PRESCHOOLERS (3-4 YEARS OLD) likely to need care don't have access to a high-quality program.

OUR PROGRESS

Thanks to generous supporters like you, Let's Grow Kids has partnered with Vermonters to create 20 new child care spaces. And 698 people in Lamoille County from all walks of life have joined together to support our shared movement.

Since 2018, you've helped Let's Grow Kids invest \$886,764 in Lamoille County to build a child care system that works for children and families, early educators, and communities.

But there's more work to do.

Through 2025, we'll invest another \$1.34 million to solve the child care crisis for all Lamoille County children, forever.

WHAT IS A CHILD CARE SPACE?

A child care "space" refers to a place for a child in a child care program. Let's Grow Kids uses "spaces" to track the availability of child care.

Not every family needs child care for a full week, so some spaces are shared between families who use part-time child care.

SPOTLIGHT ON SUCCESS

Clubhouse Kids

MORRISVILLE. VT

Kathy Cookson's high-quality child care program, Clubhouse Kids, serves 38 infants, toddlers, and preschoolers in Lamoille County.

In 2019, Kathy began working with Let's Grow Kids staff to implement SmartCare, a business management software that helps Kathy run her small business.

With SmartCare, Kathy can manage attendance, billing, employees, medical records, child and family data, and more. Parents use SmartCare to receive photos and updates and make payments.

Now, Kathy saves hours of administrative time because the tools she needs to run her business and communicate with parents are easily available on her computer and her phone.

Programs like Clubhouse Kids that have implemented SmartCare have seen an 87% increase in tuition collected, an 11% increase in families enrolled, and a 72% increase in on-time payment.

FARLY EDUCATION IS A PROFESSION

Joanna VonCulin, the director of Puffer Child Care in Morristown, is one of 135 early educators who worked with Let's Grow Kids and Champlain College in 2019 to gain her Vermont teaching license with an early educator endorsement.

Joanna, like many early educators, brought years of experience and specialized training to her job. Through this program, she got support preparing for the licensure process. With a teaching license, Joanna honors her experience as an early educator, is eligible for higher wages, and has greater job security.

CHILD CARE IS GOOD BUSINESS

At The Alchemist, working parents receive a child care scholarship of \$26 per day, plus 13 weeks of paid leave with 100% wage replacement for new parents who have given birth.

The Whole Picture

THE CURRENT STATUS OF CHILD CARE ACCESS FOR:

INFANTS (BIRTH TO 2 YEARS OLD)

- >> 69% of infants likely to need care don't have access to any regulated programs.
- >> 80% of infants likely to need care don't have access to high-quality (4- or 5-star) programs.

TODDLERS (2-3 YEARS OLD)

- >> 17% of toddlers likely to need care don't have access to any regulated programs.
- >> 46% of toddlers likely to need care don't have access to high-quality (4- or 5-star) programs.

PRESCHOOLERS (3-4 YEARS OLD)

- >> 39% of preschoolers likely to need care don't have access to any regulated programs.*
- >> 55% of preschoolers likely to need care don't have access to high-quality (4- or 5-star) programs.*
 - *Preschool child care data does not include universal pre-K.
