THE CHALLENGE

In Rutland County, 66% OF INFANTS (BIRTH TO 2 YEARS OLD) likely to need care don't have access to any regulated child care.

And. 75% OF TODDLERS (2-3 YEARS OLD) likely to need care don't have access to a high-quality program.

OUR PROGRESS

Thanks to generous supporters like you, Let's Grow Kids has partnered with Vermonters to create 319 new child care spaces and improve the quality of 427 spaces. And 1,189 people in Rutland County from all walks of life have joined together to support our shared movement.

Since 2018, you've helped Let's Grow Kids invest \$1.86 million in Rutland County to build a child care system that works for children and families, early educators, and communities.

But there's more work to do.

Through 2025, we'll invest another \$2.99 million to solve the child care crisis for all Rutland County children, forever.

WHAT IS A CHILD CARE SPACE?

A child care "space" refers to a place for a child in a child care program. Let's Grow Kids uses "spaces" to track the availability of child care.

Not every family needs child care for a full week, so some spaces are shared between families who use part-time child care.

Baby Steps Child Care

With nearly 20 years of experience in early education—and 12 of those as a child care center director—Heather Martin knew she could help ease the child care crisis for Rutland families.

In fact, Heather and her team learned through community meetings that families had been using unregulated child care and low-quality programs because of strains on child care availability.

In 2018, Heather worked with Let's Grow Kids Community and Program Support Specialist Brenda Metzler to plan for and open Baby Steps, a new child care program.

Knowing that care for infants and toddlers was desperately needed, Heather devised a partnership with the nearby Children's Center to transition children from Baby Steps's program into prekindergarten at the Children's Center.

This model allows families continuous, high-quality programming and universal pre-kindergarten for children from birth to 5. At the same time, the programs benefit from sustainable collaboration.

Heather used the funds from generous Let's Grow Kids donors to hire and retain qualified staff, install fencing for the outside space, and purchase equipment and supplies for her program. Congratulations, Heather and Baby Steps Child Care!

The Whole Picture

THE CURRENT STATUS OF CHILD CARE ACCESS FOR:

INFANTS (BIRTH TO 2 YEARS OLD)

- >> 66% of infants likely to need care don't have access to any regulated programs.
- >> 81% of infants likely to need care don't have access to high-quality (4- or 5-star) programs.

TODDLERS (2-3 YEARS OLD)

- >> 40% of toddlers likely to need care don't have access to any regulated programs.
- >> 75% of toddlers likely to need care don't have access to high-quality (4- or 5-star) programs.

PRESCHOOLERS (3-4 YEARS OLD)

- >> 37% of preschoolers likely to need care don't have access to any regulated programs.*
- >> 61% of preschoolers likely to need care don't have access to high-quality (4- or 5-star) programs.*
 - *Preschool child care data does not include universal pre-K.
