THE CHALLENGE

In Windham County, 71% OF INFANTS (BIRTH TO 2 YEARS OLD) likely to need care don't have access to any regulated child care.

And 48% OF PRESCHOOLERS (3-4 YEARS OLD) likely to need care don't have access to a high-quality program.

OUR PROGRESS

Thanks to generous supporters like you, Let's Grow Kids has partnered with Vermonters to create 101 new child care spaces. And, 1,438 people in Windham County from all walks of life have joined together to support our shared movement.

Since 2018, you've helped Let's Grow Kids invest \$1.56 million in Windham County to build a child care system that works for children and families, early educators, and communities.

But there's more work to do.

Through 2025, we'll invest another \$2.09 million to solve the child care crisis for all Windham County children, forever.

692 child care spaces for children under 5 in 34 child care programs that offer full-time, full-year child care (as of 2019).

WINDHAM COUNTY NEEDS

654 more child care spaces & 136 more lead early educators to solve the child care crisis for children birth to 5 years old.



WHAT IS A CHILD CARE SPACE?

A child care "space" refers to a place for a child in a child care program. Let's Grow Kids uses "spaces" to track the availability of child care.

Not every family needs child care for a full week, so some spaces are shared between families who use part-time child care.

The Natural Child School

BRATTLEBORO. VT

Amaryah Pendlebury has run a home-based child care program in Brattleboro for nearly nine years. Since 2018, she's worked with Let's Grow Kids to get assistance improving her program's quality and expanding her capacity to care for more infants and toddlers.

She's been working in the field for 15 years, but Amaryah understands the importance of continued learning, and takes classes to keep her skills sharp. "I am always working to improve myself and take courses to better my work with children."

Amaryah is well-aware of the challenges that families face in finding child care in Windham County. When COVID-19 came to Vermont, those challenges became even clearer.

Immediately, Let's Grow Kids and our state partners started to contact early educators about providing child care to essential workers. It just so happened that five of the six children in Amaryah's care were children of essential workers.

"I think the biggest difference is just needing to be flexible," Amaryah told Kids VT recently.

She's implemented health and safety guidelines from the State of Vermont, like sanitizing surfaces and wearing masks. And she started opening her program 15 minutes early in order to accommodate parents' work at local hospitals.

Embracing that same flexibility, Amaryah adds, "It's definitely an adventure. It's become our new normal."



The Whole Picture

THE CURRENT STATUS OF CHILD CARE ACCESS FOR:

INFANTS (BIRTH TO 2 YEARS OLD)

- >> 71% of infants likely to need care don't have access to any regulated programs.
- >> 78% of infants likely to need care don't have access to high-quality (4- or 5-star) programs.

TODDLERS (2-3 YEARS OLD)

- >> 20% of toddlers likely to need care don't have access to any regulated programs.
- >> 33% of toddlers likely to need care don't have access to high-quality (4- or 5-star) programs.

PRESCHOOLERS (3-4 YEARS OLD)

- >> 41% of preschoolers likely to need care don't have access to any regulated programs.*
- >> 48% of preschoolers likely to need care don't have access to high-quality (4- or 5-star) programs.*
 - *Preschool child care data does not include universal pre-K.
