THE CHALLENGE

In Windsor County, 61% OF INFANTS (BIRTH TO 2 YEARS OLD) likely to need care don't have access to any regulated child care.

And 37% OF TODDLERS (2-3 YEARS OLD) likely to need care don't

have access to a high-quality program.

OUR PROGRESS

Thanks to generous supporters like you, Let's Grow Kids has partnered with Vermonters to create 131 new child care spaces. And 808 people in Windsor County from all walks of life have joined together to support our shared movement.

Since 2018, you've helped Let's Grow Kids invest \$1.45 million in Windsor County to build a child care system that works for children and families, early educators, and communities.

But there's more work to do.

Through 2025, we'll invest another **\$2.28 million** to solve the child care crisis for all Windsor County children, forever.

WHAT IS A CHILD CARE SPACE?

A child care "space" refers to a place for a child in a child care program. Let's Grow Kids uses "spaces" to track the availability of child care.

Not every family needs child care for a full week, so some spaces are shared between families who use part-time child care.

SPOTLIGHT ON SUCCESS

Bridgewater Community Center

BRIDGEWATER. VT

When the hundred-plus-year-old Bridgewater Village School closed due to local consolidation in 2015, the townspeople voted to tear down the building. Almost immediately, a group of Bridgewater residents came together to save the school.

The group developed deep partnerships with town government, state agencies, local businesses, health care professionals, public schools, and nonprofits. In 2018, they formed the Bridgewater Area Community Foundation (BACF) and renamed the former school: Bridgewater Community Center.

At the time, Bridgewater had no registered or licensed child care, and programs in neighboring Woodstock had long waiting lists. So, the group committed to creating a high-quality child care center.

In late 2018, BACF started working with Brenda Metzler, a Let's Grow Kids staff member, Bridgewater resident, and early education expert. Thanks to generous donors like you, Brenda provides customized support to BACF as they build their program and navigate the early childhood landscape.

In 2019, BACF applied for and used a Let's Grow Kids grant of \$23,100 to renovate several former classrooms into beautiful infant and toddler program spaces ready to welcome 14 children.

They were also able to pay a consultant to develop philosophies and policies, and to hire their founding director. BACF has laid the foundation for future expansion and long-term sustainability.

The Whole Picture

THE CURRENT STATUS OF CHILD CARE ACCESS FOR:

INFANTS (BIRTH TO 2 YEARS OLD)

- >> 61% of infants likely to need care don't have access to any regulated programs.
- >> 68% of infants likely to need care don't have access to high-quality (4- or 5-star) programs.

TODDLERS (2-3 YEARS OLD)

- >> 24% of toddlers likely to need care don't have access to any regulated programs.
- >> 37% of toddlers likely to need care don't have access to high-quality (4- or 5-star) programs.

PRESCHOOLERS (3-4 YEARS OLD)

- >> 12% of preschoolers likely to need care don't have access to any regulated programs.*
- >> 26% of preschoolers likely to need care don't have access to high-quality (4- or 5-star) programs.*
 - *Preschool child care data does not include universal pre-K.
